Important information


• Water bottles – You will need a water bottle to bring to school every day with your name on it. We put these in the tray by the sink in our classroom.

11:00am and lunchtime is 12:15-1:15pm. At lunchtime, you will go out to play and will be called in to go for lunch after Year 4.


Your activity days at playtime and lunch are as follows:



Reading books and reading records

At the start of their reading journey, pupils will have three types of reading books: Prime, Power and Pleasure. When pupils graduate from the Read Write Inc phonics scheme, they will have two types of books – Power and Pleasure.

Prime books will be changed weekly . **Your library day is on a Friday.** Pupils can choose a reading book they would like to read from their colour book band.

Pupils are expected to read regularly at home and have their reading record signed by an adult **5 times per week** in their reading record book.



PRIME Books are linked to a RWInc Book that is used in phonics sessions and has matching sounds. These books are essential for decoding and for early reading.

POWER Books are levelled by book bands, they are from a variety of reading schemes. These books give a structured approach to children developing their reading further.

PLEASURE Books are 'real books' found in the school library and class reading areas.

How can I help my child at home?

We would really encourage you to talk to your child regularly about what they have been learning about in school. A good starting point could be:

"Tell me about your day."

We would also recommend:

- <u>Reading</u>- Ensure your child is reading at least 5 times a
 week and ask them questions about what they have
 read to ensure they understand and develop their
 comprehension skills. Read books to your child and try
 to use a wide variety of genres and types of book.
- Verbal feedback- Ask your child about their learning daily and find out about their school day. Ask them what conversations they have had with their class teacher about their learning.
- Homework routine Set a weekly timetable so that your child gets into a good routine of doing homework, including reading, practising their spellings and times tables and completing homework tasks.
- Learning through play- Use games at home to practise key learning skills. For example, you could ask your child to write a story, act out a play, write a shopping list together, make a model, show you another way of completing a maths calculation the possibilities are endless!

School Uniform Policy

At South Hill School we believe that school uniform can play a key role in providing a sense of belonging and identity. Parents and carers are asked to ensure that pupils follow the School Uniform Policy. We are proud of our pupils and the way they are dressed at school.

School uniform for all pupils

- White blouse or white polo shirt (with or without school crest)
- Grey skirt, pinafore or grey trousers
- Bottle green sweatshirt, cardigan or fleece (with or without school crest)
- White, grey or black socks, or grey or black tights
- Footwear: sensible black school shoes (not trainers)

Summer uniform

- Grey shorts
- Green and white striped or checked school dress or playsuit
- Sun hat or cap

Outdoor wear

• Warm, waterproof coat for outdoor breaks and lunchtimes

PE kit for all pupils (to be worn on PE days)

- Green PE T-shirt
- Plain black or green shorts
- Black cycling shorts
- Plain black or green joggers
- School fleece
- Black or white trainers

Forest School

- Wellies or old trainers
- A waterproof coat
- Additional outerwear according to weather (eg gloves, hats, sun hats etc)

Reception and KS1 pupils must have a book bag or rucksack in green or black

KS2 pupils must have a rucksack in green or black

Hair - All pupils with long hair should have their hair tied back

Nail Varnish - Nail varnish is <u>not</u> permitted

Earrings – Stud earrings only. No earrings should be worn on PE days. If they are, pupils are responsible for removing earrings or taping them up. No other jewellery to be worn (with the exception of religious artefacts, which must be removed for PE)

Please name all school uniform, so that it can be reunited with its owner if it is mislaid.

Unnamed lost property is regularly displayed outside the KS1 entrance by the hall.

Unclaimed uniform is disposed of at the end of each term.
